# Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 20) - 9/24/2023

### **SERIES THEME**

### TELL US A STORY

Much of what Jesus has to say to you and me is contained within his parables. Parables are simple little stories that contain profound truths about life and eternity. For the believer, a parable takes a challenging spiritual fact and makes it clear. However, since the parable conveys spiritual truth, for someone without faith, the story remains only that—a story. Therefore, our prayer for this worship series is that Christ would send us his Holy Spirit, so that we might receive the peace and power Jesus offers us in his parables. Tell us a story, Jesus! Our worship follows this path:

## THEME OF THE DAY

#### A STORY OF PERPLEXING GENEROSITY

Give a single bag of M&Ms to two four-year-olds and tell them to share. You will witness counting done with accountantlike precision. Each child will get an equal amount of candy because that is fair. Human beings have an incredibly strong sense of fairness. That is why it can be so perplexing when we see how God dispenses blessing and grace. We see people who mock God who are more prosperous than believers. We see people who convert on their deathbed, and Scripture tells us they obtain the same salvation as someone who has been Christian all his life. How is that fair?

Through a simple story, Jesus teaches us a profound truth. We need to stop expecting God to be fair. God is not fair. He does not give us what we deserve, and that's called mercy. In fact, he gives us what we don't deserve, and that's called grace. No, God is not fair. He is breathtakingly generous.

#### **FIRST READING**

Jonah 3:10-4:11 – Jonah is perplexed by the generous forgiveness God showed to the people of Nineveh.

#### SECOND READING

Romans 9:6-16 – God is perplexingly generous. He shows mercy and grace to those he chooses, regardless of any merit or worth.

#### GOSPEL

\*\*\*Matthew 20:1-16 – Jesus tells us a story of God's perplexing generosity.

# Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 21) - 10/1/2023

### **SERIES THEME**

### TELL US A STORY

For the believer, a parable takes a challenging spiritual fact and makes it clear. However, since the parable conveys spiritual truth, for someone without faith, the story remains only that—a story. Therefore, our prayer for this worship series is that Christ would send us his Holy Spirit, so that we might receive the peace and power Jesus offers us in his parables. Tell us a story, Jesus!

### THEME OF THE DAY

#### A STORY OF SPIRITUAL INSINCERITY

You have maybe heard the accusation or perhaps even made it yourself: "He's so fake!" That charge claims someone's friendliness or kindness is a sham. Such insincerity bothers us. We would generally rather someone be honest about how they feel about us than be fake.

Through a story Jesus teaches us that God feels the same. God doesn't want us to simply go through religious motions like some sort of show. He sees right through that. God's desire is that our repentance would demonstrate sincere sorrow over sin. God wants us to see the grace and forgiveness he has shown us in Christ, and in response, to love him back deeply and sincerely.

#### **FIRST READING**

Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32 – The prophet Ezekiel gives a strong warning to Christians who have grown dismissive of their sin. God wants sincere repentance that leads to true obedience.

#### SECOND READING

Philippians 2:1-11 – Moved by Christ's love and empowered by the Spirit, we sincerely attempt to imitate the selflessness and humility of Jesus.

#### GOSPEL

\*\*\*Matthew 21:23-32 – Through a story Jesus teaches that sincere love for God involves not just saying what God wants to hear but doing what God wants done.

# Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 22) - 10/8/2023

### **SERIES THEME**

#### **TELL US A STORY**

## THEME OF THE DAY

#### A STORY OF RECKLESS PATIENCE

Patience is a virtue. But can too much patience be a vice? If you are too patient, waiting to see if that pain in your stomach goes away with time, you might make a problem worse. If you are too patient with an incompetent employee, you will lose productivity before the inevitable—his firing—occurs anyway. Too much patience would seem not to be a virtue, but reckless behavior.

Yet that is exactly what God demonstrates to a rebellious human race—reckless patience. Through a story Jesus teaches exactly what God's patience means for us.

Note to the preacher: "Reckless" can have negative connotations. Common synonyms are: negligent, thoughtless, careless, imprudent. Those concepts may come to mind first. However, other synonyms for "reckless" are: bold, courageous, resolute, valiant. That is what is meant here. You see it in the owner of the vineyard. The tenants either abused or killed what seems to be seven or more servants. Who would respond to that by now sending his son? A father who is reckless with his patience.

This provides the preacher an opportunity to contrast the parable with reality. In the parable, one could make the case that the father was reckless in the sense of imprudent. These tenants are pure evil. Why would he think they would treat his son any differently than his servants? But God the Father knew exactly what would happen when he sent his Son. He knew Jesus would be worse than stoned to death. For the Father to send the Son and for the Son to go: that demonstrated a recklessness in the sense of courageous or resolute. There was courage needed by both. And that courage was there, because both were perfectly resolute in their desire to save tenants like us.

#### FIRST READING

Isaiah 5:1-7 – The LORD Almighty pictures his patient love for Israel as an owner of a vineyard patiently waiting for a good crop of fruit.

#### SECOND READING

Philippians 3:12-21 – Through Christ we have already attained the kingdom of heaven. God patiently waits for us to respond to his grace by living drastically different lives than the people of this world.

#### GOSPEL

\*\*\*Matthew 21:33-43 – Jesus tells us a story of God's reckless patience.

## THEME OF THE DAY

### A STORY OF INSANE REJECTION

There are invitations we might be tempted to reject: an invitation to an event you are not interested in, an invitation to a party that takes place at the same time as something else you want to do. There are other invitations which people would say you've lost your mind to reject: an invitation to go on a free tropical vacation, an invitation to go backstage and meet your favorite musical group, an invitation to the Super Bowl. We get so many invitations. Some we accept; others we reject.

Where does God's invitation to participate in his heavenly banquet rank? Scripture often pictures eternal life as a joyful party, full of friends and family, laughter, and the finest foods. Through a story Jesus teaches us how insane it would be to reject God's gracious invitation to that eternal celebration. More, Jesus tells us what we need to get into that best of all banquets.

#### **FIRST READING**

Isaiah 25:6-9 – The prophet Isaiah describes the heavenly banquet, where death and tears will be no more. How does one get in? Through faith in God and his salvation.

### SECOND READING

Romans 1:16-17 – We are saved through faith alone. May we never reject this gospel truth.

### GOSPEL

\*\*\*Matthew 22:1-14 – Jesus tells a story of those who insanely rejected a king's gracious invitation.
